

Brief of the Authority

Ekota Samaj Kallyan Sangstha (ESKS) was established in response to the persistent poverty and systemic inequalities faced by the people of Bangladesh. While national development strategies have often fallen short, grassroots organizations like ESKS have emerged as beacons of hope, driven by committed social activists. ESKS is a non-profit, non-political, voluntary organization dedicated to empowering women, disadvantaged groups, and underprivileged communities.

Bangladesh remains challenged by deep-rooted poverty, gender disparity, and natural disasters. Women disproportionately bear the burden of poverty, facing systemic discrimination and limited access to resources. In this context, ESKS strives to create meaningful and sustainable change by promoting gender equity, human rights, and social justice.

Goal

To establish a gender-equity-based society, eliminate discrimination and violence against women, and ensure sustainable development for women and the underprivileged.

Mission Statement

To unite and empower women and disadvantaged groups, enabling their participation in all spheres of development. ESKS advocates for programs that address the needs of marginalized communities in the most effective and cost-efficient manner.

Objectives

- Develop strategies to address the challenges faced by disadvantaged groups.
- Design and implement projects benefiting underprivileged communities.
- Foster mutual support and cooperation among target groups.
- Provide grassroots-level training and skill development programs.
- Promote strong and participatory leadership.
- Encourage self-reliance through the development and use of local resources.
- Stimulate human potential toward self-actualization.
- Uphold human rights for all, regardless of gender, caste, or creed.
- Advocate for good governance through lobbying and awareness campaigns.

Geographic Focus Areas

In 2024, Ekota Samaj Kallayan Sangstha (ESKS) implemented key interventions across **Lalmonirhat**, Bangladesh. This region, often vulnerable to socio-economic and climate-induced challenges, has become a focal point for pioneering community development efforts.

Key Attributes of Lalmonirhat:

- Environmental Challenges: Frequent flooding, river erosion, and climate vulnerabilities.
- **Economic Constraints**: High dependency on subsistence agriculture and limited livelihood diversification.
- **Social Gaps**: Inadequate access to education, healthcare, and essential services, particularly in marginalized groups.

Themes of Intervention

1. Child Rights and Education

ESKS is committed to nurturing the potential of children by ensuring access to quality education and protection of their fundamental rights. The organization emphasizes building a safe, supportive, and inclusive environment for children to thrive.





 Non-Formal Education: ESKS provides alternative education to children who are excluded from formal schooling. Through creative teaching methods and community-based learning centers, the program bridges educational gaps and reintegrates children into mainstream schools, ensuring no child is left behind.

• Cybercrime Education Through ICT:

Recognizing the digital age's opportunities and risks, ESKS conducts workshops and training sessions to educate children and young adults about safe online practices. By empowering them with knowledge about digital threats such as cyberbullying, online exploitation, and identity theft, the program aims to create a safer virtual environment.

Child Protection:

ESKS advocates for children's rights by conducting campaigns and implementing community-based initiatives to prevent exploitation, abuse, and neglect. The organization collaborates with local authorities, families, and schools to establish protective mechanisms and ensure a secure upbringing for every child.

2. Women Empowerment and Maternal Health

ESKS believes that empowering women and supporting maternal health are vital to building resilient communities. Through targeted interventions, the organization promotes equity, independence, and well-being for women.

• Women Empowerment Programs:

By offering vocational training, cooperative initiatives, and leadership development workshops, ESKS enables women to enhance their skills and achieve financial independence. Programs focus on tailoring, handicrafts, small-business management, and digital literacy, encouraging women to actively participate in decision-making processes.

• Support for Lactating Mothers and Pregnant Women:

ESKS provides expecting and new mothers with vital healthcare, nutrition education, and emotional support. The initiative includes pre- and post-natal care, access to midwives, and awareness sessions on maternal health and child care.

• Nutritious Diet Programs:

With a focus on reducing malnutrition, ESKS promotes healthy eating habits and provides nutritional supplements to women and children. The program includes cooking demonstrations, diet planning, and distribution of fortified food to ensure maternal and child health.



3. Livelihood Development and Sustainable Agriculture

To promote economic independence and resilience, ESKS focuses on skill development and environmentally sustainable practices, particularly in rural communities.

Chicken and Cattle Rearing Projects:

ESKS supports families with training and resources for livestock rearing, providing an additional income source. The initiative includes veterinary support, feed supply, and market linkage to ensure sustainability.

• Nursery and Forestation Projects:

Encouraging environmental conservation, ESKS helps communities develop nurseries and plant trees to improve livelihoods while addressing environmental degradation.



These projects create employment opportunities and promote biodiversity.

• Cooperative Livelihood Development:

Through cooperative systems, ESKS facilitates resource sharing and joint economic ventures among community members. This approach strengthens economic networks and fosters collective growth.

4. Health and Well-being

ESKS ensures access to essential healthcare services and promotes holistic community well-being through education and targeted interventions.

• Primary Healthcare Programs:

ESKS brings healthcare services to underserved areas using mobile clinics and community health workers. The initiative addresses common illnesses, provides immunizations, and promotes preventive healthcare practices.

• COVID-19 Awareness and Response:

In response to the pandemic, ESKS launched campaigns to educate communities about preventive measures such as hand hygiene, mask-wearing, and vaccination. The organization also distributed hygiene kits and food supplies to vulnerable families.



5. Adult Literacy and Lifelong Learning

ESKS is dedicated to enhancing the knowledge and skills of adults, empowering them to lead informed and improved lives.



Adult Literacy Projects:

Innovative literacy programs by ESKS focus on teaching reading, writing, and arithmetic to adults, especially women, enabling them to participate more actively in family and community affairs.

• Community Awareness Campaigns:

The organization conducts workshops and campaigns on critical issues like hygiene, disaster preparedness, gender equality, and financial literacy. These sessions aim to create a more informed and resilient population.

6. Environmental Conservation and Resilience

ESKS emphasizes sustainable development and resilience-building through climate adaptation and environmental stewardship programs.

• Forestation Initiatives:

ESKS plants trees to combat deforestation, restore ecosystems, and improve soil fertility. Community involvement ensures these initiatives have lasting impacts on both the environment and livelihoods.

• Disaster Preparedness Programs:

As climate change increases the frequency of natural disasters, ESKS trains communities to prepare for and respond to events like floods and droughts. Programs include early warning systems, evacuation drills, and the construction of climate-resilient shelters.

Project Highlight: Health Awareness and Aid Distribution in Post Covid 19

Donor: Clark D Smith , USA

Location: Marginalized Communities Across Lalmonirhat





Overview

In response to the unprecedented challenges posed by the COVID-19 pandemic, the project, generously funded by Clark D Smith, was launched to address the urgent needs of Bangladesh's most vulnerable populations. This initiative targeted marginalized communities disproportionately affected by the pandemic, providing critical support to protect their health and well-being.

Key Objectives

1. **Raise Awareness:** Educate communities about COVID-19 preventive measures, symptoms, and treatment options through targeted awareness campaigns.

- 2. **Aid Distribution:** Distribute essential protective supplies, including face masks, hand sanitizers, disinfectants, and personal hygiene kits.
- 3. **Marginalized Focus:** Prioritize aid for the most at-risk groups, including daily wage laborers, elderly individuals, and underserved families in rural and urban slums.

Implementation Strategies

- 1. **Community Engagement:** Partner with local leaders, health workers, and volunteers to reach the most disadvantaged communities effectively. Information sessions were conducted in small, socially distanced groups to ensure the safety of participants while disseminating vital knowledge about the virus and its prevention.
- 2. **Supply Distribution:** Over 10000 hygiene kits, including masks, sanitizers, and soaps, were distributed across [Insert Number] districts. The project leveraged both public and private transport networks to ensure timely delivery to remote areas.
- 3. **Multichannel Awareness Campaigns:** Utilizing radio broadcasts, posters, and mobile loudspeakers, the project disseminated WHO and government-approved COVID-19 guidelines, ensuring the message reached non-literate populations as well.

Impact

- **Reach:** The project directly benefited individuals across the marginalized communities in Bangladesh.
- **Behavioral Change:** Increased adoption of COVID-19 preventive measures, such as mask-wearing and regular handwashing, was observed in project areas.
- **Community Safety:** By equipping vulnerable groups with the tools and knowledge to combat the pandemic, the project contributed significantly to reducing infection rates within these high-risk communities.

Challenges and Lessons Learned

Despite its success, the project faced several challenges, including:

- **Supply Chain Disruptions:** Initial delays in procuring and distributing protective supplies due to lockdown restrictions.
- Misinformation: Countering widespread myths about COVID-19 required sustained and tailored communication efforts.
- Accessibility Issues: Reaching remote areas demanded innovative approaches, such as engaging local volunteers and using bicycles for supply delivery.

The project highlighted the importance of community engagement, rapid response mechanisms, and localized solutions in addressing global health crises.

Project Highlight: "Combating Cybercrime through ICT"

Donor: ICT Department, Ministry of ICT, Bangladesh

Location: Various Marginalized Communities Across Bangladesh

Overview

The "Combating Cybercrime through ICT" project, financed by the ICT Department under the Ministry of ICT, Bangladesh, was a pioneering initiative aimed at equipping unemployed and marginalized youth with essential ICT skills. The project not only enhanced their employability but also empowered them to combat cybercrime and safeguard themselves and their communities against digital threats.

Key Objectives

- Digital Literacy and Skill Development: Train unemployed and marginalized youth in computer literacy and ICT to enhance their professional competencies.
- 2. **Cybercrime Awareness:** Educate participants on cybercrime, its implications, and best practices for safe online behavior.
- 3. **Employment Opportunities:** Enable trained youth to secure jobs in government and non-government organizations, contributing to economic empowerment.



Implementation Strategies

1. Targeted Training Programs:

- Curriculum Development: Tailored ICT training modules were developed, covering topics such as basic computer operations, cybersecurity, and online safety practices.
- Practical Skill-Building: Hands-on training sessions emphasized practical applications of ICT skills, including basic programming, data entry, and digital communication tools.
- Cybersecurity Focus: Workshops addressed cybercrime awareness, teaching participants to recognize phishing attempts, safeguard personal data, and understand cyber laws.

2. Inclusive Recruitment:

 Focused on engaging youth from marginalized backgrounds, with special attention to unemployed graduates, women, and economically disadvantaged groups.

3. Community Engagement:

- Partnered with local organizations to identify eligible participants and maximize outreach.
- Conducted awareness campaigns to promote the importance of cybersecurity and the potential of ICT in improving livelihoods.





Impact

- Beneficiaries: Over 2000 youth received ICT and cybersecurity training, equipping them with marketable skills.
- **Employment Outcomes:** A significant proportion of trainees secured employment in government offices, private companies, and NGOs. Many others ventured into freelance opportunities in the digital economy.
- **Cybercrime Awareness:** Raised awareness among young people about the dangers of cybercrime, fostering a culture of responsible internet use.
- **Skill Development:** Participants reported increased confidence in using digital tools and navigating the online space securely.

Success Stories

- **Rina's Transformation:** A 23-year-old from Aditmari, Lalmonirhat,, Rina enrolled in the program with little knowledge of computers. After completing the training, she secured a data entry position in a local NGO, enabling her to support her family financially.
- Rahim's Contribution: Rahim, an unemployed graduate, became a cybersecurity advocate in his community after the training, conducting awareness sessions to educate others about safe online practices.

Challenges and Lessons Learned

- **Digital Divide:** Limited access to computers and internet connectivity in rural areas posed initial challenges. Mobile training units and subsidized internet access were introduced to address these issues.
- **Sustainability:** Ensuring continued engagement of participants required follow-up sessions and alumni support groups.
- **Misinformation:** Combating misconceptions about ICT and cybercrime demanded consistent and clear messaging.

This project showcased the transformative power of ICT in building skills, raising awareness, and improving the livelihoods of marginalized communities, while also contributing to national efforts to combat cybercrime.

Project Highlight: "Care for Lactating Mothers"

Donor: Ministry of Women and Children Affairs, People's Republic of Bangladesh

Location: Lalmonirhat

Overview

The "Care for Lactating Mothers" project, funded by the Ministry of Women and Children Affairs, aimed to improve the health and well-being of pregnant and lactating mothers, along with their newborns. This initiative focused on raising awareness, promoting health and nutrition, and providing essential training to ensure the holistic development of children and the empowerment of their families.



Key Objectives

1. **Maternal Health Awareness:** Educate pregnant and lactating mothers on critical health issues, nutrition, and self-care practices.

- 2. **Newborn Care:** Provide guidance on infant care, focusing on health hazards, nutrition, and early development.
- 3. **Educational Awareness:** Advocate for the importance of early education and proper upbringing for long-term child development.



Implementation Strategies

1. Community Training Programs:

- Maternal Health Workshops: Conducted sessions on prenatal and postnatal care, focusing on dietary requirements, mental well-being, and safe practices for mothers.
- **Newborn Care Seminars:** Focused on infant nutrition, immunization schedules, hygiene practices, and managing common health issues in newborns.
- Educational Awareness Meetings: Emphasized the importance of early education, encouraging families to prepare for their children's educational journey from an early age.

2. Family-Centric Awareness Campaigns:

- Community meetings involved both mothers and family members to ensure shared responsibility and support for maternal and child care.
- Distributed easy-to-understand informational materials, such as posters and leaflets, to reinforce key messages.

3. Support Groups and Networking:

- Established support groups for mothers to share experiences and receive ongoing guidance from health professionals.
- Built partnerships with local healthcare providers to ensure mothers and children had access to necessary medical services.

Impact

- **Beneficiaries:** Over 1000 pregnant and lactating mothers participated in the project, positively impacting their health and their children's well-being.
- **Health Improvements:** Participants reported better health outcomes for both mothers and infants, with increased awareness of nutrition and hygiene practices.
- **Behavioral Change:** Families demonstrated greater involvement in the care and upbringing of newborns, fostering an environment of shared responsibility.
- **Educational Advocacy:** Many families expressed increased interest in securing early education opportunities for their children.



Success Stories

• **Shamima's Journey:** A young mother, Shamima benefited from the project's training sessions, learning how to prepare nutritious meals for herself and her baby. She also became an advocate for maternal health in her community.

• **A Family Transformed:** The project's family-focused approach helped one household recognize the importance of early childhood education, inspiring them to enroll their toddler in a local pre-school program.

Challenges and Lessons Learned

- **Cultural Barriers:** Traditional beliefs and practices sometimes conflicted with project recommendations, requiring culturally sensitive communication strategies.
- **Resource Constraints:** Limited availability of healthcare resources in remote areas necessitated innovative solutions, such as mobile health clinics.
- **Sustainability:** Ensuring continued family engagement required follow-up programs and community-based support systems.

This project successfully highlighted the critical role of maternal health and early childhood care in building a healthier and more educated society. By addressing the needs of both mothers and children, the initiative created a ripple effect, fostering long-term community well-being.

Project Highlight: "Vulnerable Group Development (VGD) Program"

Overview


The Vulnerable Group Development (VGD) program was designed to uplift marginalized and vulnerable women through skill development, economic empowerment, and financial literacy. Funded by the Ministry of Women and Children Affairs, this initiative focused on equipping women with the tools and knowledge to secure sustainable livelihoods while fostering a culture of savings and cooperative development.



Key Objectives

1. **Income-Generating Skills:** Provide vocational and entrepreneurial training to empower women with marketable skills.

- 2. **Rights Awareness:** Educate women about their labor rights, workplace safety, and gender equity.
- 3. **Savings and Financial Inclusion:** Encourage savings habits, connect participants with banking services, and facilitate cooperative society development for collective economic progress.



Implementation Strategies

1. Skill Development Training:

- Organized workshops on income-generating activities such as handicrafts, tailoring, poultry farming, and small-scale business management.
- Provided hands-on training tailored to the local economy and market demands, enabling participants to secure sustainable income sources.

2. Awareness Programs:

- Conducted sessions on women's labor rights, workplace safety, and legal protections to build confidence and self-advocacy.
- Organized group discussions to enhance awareness of gender equity, shared responsibility, and community development.

3. Savings and Cooperative Formation:

- Facilitated training on the importance of savings, financial planning, and resource management.
- Linked participants with local banks to open savings accounts, ensuring their access to financial services.

 Supported the formation of cooperative societies for collective economic ventures, promoting resource sharing and joint decision-making.



Impact

- **Empowered Beneficiaries:** Over 250 women gained skills in income-generating activities, significantly improving their household incomes.
- **Financial Independence:** A large percentage of participants opened savings accounts and began practicing financial literacy, laying the groundwork for economic resilience.
- **Cooperative Societies:** Several cooperative societies were established, fostering collaboration and long-term community growth.
- **Rights Awareness:** Participants reported increased confidence in asserting their rights and navigating workplace challenges.

Success Stories

- Salma's Transformation: A participant, Salma learned tailoring through the program and began her small business. Today, she not only supports her family but also employs two other women in her community.
- From Vulnerability to Leadership: A group of women from Aditmari, Lalmonirhat formed a cooperative society after completing the program. The cooperative now runs a small poultry farm, creating sustainable income for its members.

Challenges and Lessons Learned

- **Cultural Resistance:** Initial resistance to women engaging in income-generating activities required community engagement and awareness-building efforts.
- **Market Access:** Ensuring participants had access to markets for their products remains a critical area for further intervention.
- **Sustained Engagement:** Continued follow-up and mentorship are essential to maintain the momentum and support newly formed cooperatives.

This project demonstrated the transformative potential of targeted interventions in vulnerable communities. By equipping women with the skills, knowledge, and confidence to achieve financial independence, the VGD program fostered a culture of resilience and empowerment that will have lasting effects on families and communities.


Overview

The "Promoting Nutritious Food Intake and Addressing Food Adulteration Risks" project, funded by the Ministry of Science and Technology, aimed to improve community health by raising awareness about balanced nutrition and the dangers of food adulteration. Implemented by ESKS, this initiative addressed key dietary concerns, promoting safe and informed food practices through education, engagement, and advocacy.



Key Objectives

- 1. **Nutritional Awareness:** Educate communities on the importance of balanced diets and nutrient-rich foods for better health outcomes.
- 2. **Food Safety Education:** Raise awareness of the risks associated with food adulteration and promote the consumption of safe, unadulterated products.
- 3. **Community Empowerment:** Foster collective responsibility among individuals, vendors, and authorities to ensure food safety and nutritional well-being.



Implementation Strategies

1. Awareness and Capacity-Building Initiatives:

- **Workshops and Seminars:** Hosted sessions with experts on nutrition, health risks of adulterated food, and dietary planning for diverse groups.
- Community Meetings: Organized interactive discussions to address local food safety concerns and share practical tips for safer eating habits.


Project Highlight: "Women Empowerment through Community and Agricultural Development"


Overview



Implemented by ESKS, this initiative sought to empower marginalized and street children by advocating for their right to education and incorporating them into formal schooling systems. Through this project, ESKS worked to protect children's rights and provide them with opportunities for a better future.



Key Objectives

- Eradication of Child Labor: Advocate against child labor and facilitate access to education for affected children.
- 2. **Prevention of Child Abuse:** Raise awareness about child abuse and establish mechanisms for reporting and addressing such issues.

Overview

The Primary Healthcare at the Community Level (PHC) project, generously funded by Semavi, The Netherlands, aimed to enhance the health and well-being of marginalized communities by addressing their primary healthcare needs. This initiative emphasized training on health-related issues for mothers, children, and vulnerable groups, ensuring access to basic healthcare services and promoting hygiene and disease prevention.



Key Objectives

- 1. **Health Awareness and Training:** Educate community members, especially mothers and children, on primary healthcare practices and disease prevention.



Through its multifaceted approach, the project addressed various livelihood opportunities, including agriculture, livestock management, and afforestation.



Key Objectives

- 1. **Skill Development:** Provide training in diverse income-generating trades and activities to enable self-sufficiency.
- 2. **Savings Promotion:** Encourage a culture of savings among marginalized communities to ensure financial security.

- 3. **Sustainable Livelihoods:** Promote sustainable practices in agriculture, livestock, and fisheries to support long-term economic growth.
- 4. **Community Empowerment:** Foster cooperative models to strengthen community engagement and shared responsibility.



Implementation Strategies



Project Highlight: Non-Formal Education, Adult Literacy, and Afforestation Initiative

Donor: Proshika, Bangladesh **Location:** Lalmonirhat

Overview

This project, generously financed by Proshika, Bangladesh, was a multi-faceted initiative that sought to address critical community challenges: improving access to education for marginalized groups and fostering environmental sustainability through afforestation efforts. It focused on providing non-formal education to dropped-out youths and teens, literacy training for illiterate adults, and promoting afforestation along roadsides to combat environmental degradation.



Key Objectives

- 1. **Non-Formal Education:** Reintegrate dropped-out youths and teens into the educational process by providing them with alternative learning opportunities equivalent to formal fifth-grade education.
- 2. **Adult Literacy:** Educate illiterate adults to enhance their reading, writing, and numeracy skills, empowering them to participate in social and economic activities.

3. **Afforestation Initiatives:** Promote tree planting along roadsides and in community spaces to restore greenery, improve air quality, and combat climate change.

Activities of ESKS

Establishment of Non-Formal Schools

As part of its education initiatives, ESKS established five non-formal primary education centers in its project areas to ensure accessible learning opportunities for underprivileged children.

In the village of Bhelabari, a school named Morich Bari was set up, where 17 male learners and 13 female learners, totaling 30 students, were enrolled.

In Salmara, two schools were established. The first, named Nadir Paar, had 20 male learners and 10 female learners, totaling 30 students. The second, Majpara, enrolled 15 male and 15 female learners, also totaling 30 students.

In the village of Jigapara, a school bearing the same name, Jigapara, was founded. It had 14 male learners and 16 female learners, adding up to 30 students.

Overall Learner Statistics

Across these five schools, a total of 78 male learners and 72 female learners were enrolled, bringing the grand total to 150 students.

Key Achievements

These efforts have significantly improved access to primary education for disadvantaged children in the project areas, promoting gender equity in education and contributing to the holistic development of rural communities.

Implementation Strategies

Education for Youths and Teens:

- Established community-based non-formal education centers for school dropouts.
- Designed curricula aligned with fifth-grade formal education standards to bridge gaps in learning.
- Focused on skills that prepare youths for formal education reentry or vocational training.

2. Adult Literacy Programs:

- Conducted literacy classes for adults, emphasizing practical skills like basic math, reading, and writing.
- o Incorporated life skills education to enable participants to make informed decisions in their daily lives.

3. Afforestation Projects:

- o Organized community tree-planting events along roadsides and in other public spaces.
- Provided training on tree care and maintenance to ensure the sustainability of afforestation efforts.

• Engaged local communities in promoting environmental stewardship.

Impact

- **Reintegration of Youths:** Many dropped-out students were able to resume their education or transition to vocational training programs, offering them a pathway to a better future.
- **Empowered Adults:** Literacy programs enabled adults to engage more actively in community activities, manage household finances, and access better employment opportunities.
- **Environmental Benefits:** The afforestation initiative enhanced the community's greenery, reduced soil erosion, and contributed to a healthier environment for future generations.

Success Stories

- **Empowering a Young Learner:** A 16-year-old dropout attended a non-formal education center and later enrolled in a vocational training program, now earning a stable income to support their family.
- **A Literate Entrepreneur:** A 45-year-old participant of the literacy program successfully opened a small shop after learning how to maintain basic financial records.
- **Restoring Community Pride:** Roadside afforestation in [Insert Location] transformed barren lands into green corridors, instilling a sense of pride and ownership among local residents.

Challenges and Lessons Learned


Project Highlight: Adult Literacy for Absolute Illiterates

This transformative project, financed by the Denmark-based donor agency Danny Doe, focused on addressing the issue of adult illiteracy among the most marginalized and underserved communities. It aimed to uplift adults who were completely illiterate, providing them with the foundational skills necessary to read, write, and improve their quality of life.



Key Objectives

- 1. **Literacy for All:** Deliver targeted literacy programs to absolute illiterates, enabling them to acquire basic reading, writing, and numeracy skills.
- 2. **Empowerment through Education:** Promote self-reliance and social participation by equipping participants with essential life skills.
- 3. **Community Engagement:** Foster a culture of learning within communities by encouraging collective efforts to eliminate adult illiteracy.

Implementation Strategies

1. Customized Literacy Programs:
